 - Is in this position as Dean Martz chose not to be renewed for another term
 - Reason for this position is because we are in a stage of transition we needed someone to represent the college while this is happening
 - We don't know what will happen with the college of graduate studies role is to keep the college going for now to maintain the status quo
 - After Christmas 2013, Dean Baxter-Jones will be around to assist with the administration changes
 - Since January:
 - Thanks GSA the successful gala and the feedback from attendees was very positive and there were also program deans that wished they were invited: suggestion that all colleges be reached as much as possible

- Event was a great opportunity to hear the students' success stories
- Congratulate the UPASS implementation
- Plan to determine what to do with Postdoctoral fellows currently not many policies and procedures for this.
- CGSR is now part of a larger body that oversees post-doctoral fellows nationally Trevor Crowe is a part of this
- We are one of the only province that does not have a post-doc funding through the government
- President wants us to be more research intensive
- GSA is talking to the provincial minister to look at the graduate retention program – has sparked an interest in the government and he is moving forward with this issue
 - Urges students to start pushing the MLAs now
- The president is in favor of these and assisting with these initiatives
- Orientation was a successful event and CGSR will continue to assist with this
- CGSR in process of updating their policy and procedure manuals
 - Trying to ensure that the policies are being used at the unit level and not just when problems arise
- CGSR seem to have a role of policing programs hopes that the units and students help CGSR role to change to being facilitators and not policing
- Scholarships and awards there's an uncertainty about the best way to look at the grade conversion
 - has hired someone to write up a report of this to better identify best practices and then eventually have someone do the grade point conversion that is the same throughout
- transform us how it affects us directly is the interdisciplinary studies
 - will also look at some of the graduate courses provided by CGSR
 - also some ESL certificates that are provided
- Aboriginal student recruitment and retaining is being reviewed
- Scholarship and stipend
 - President has instructed Dean Baxter-Jones to look at this issue
 - Currently there is no system that looks at the funding for the graduate students to ensure consistency
 - Need to look at the institution to increase funding and the government needs to also increase funds
 - The SK innovation and opportunity scholarship is the major funding provided in conjunction with the government
 - Idea of this fund has a matching funding component by university
 - Hoping to double this amount
 - Dean scholarship (entry levels) are being provided
 - Other miscellaneous scholarships some that require matching from supervisors
 - Currently there is little understanding about how graduate students are being funding, sources, allocations, amount, etc.

- CGSR gives out ~25% of graduate scholarships and stipends, the other amounts are from the colleges and departments and researchers
- ~4% awarded are from non-devolved funding looking at these need to be increased and by how much and where will it come from
- Also comparing the funding to the U15
- Range of funding here range from 0 \$90 000. Going forward with a median for a masters students ~\$15 000. For PhD, average is ~\$19000 here but near \$23000 for the U15 average
- Devolved funding worth \$3.3 million given to colleges to distribute on their own
- Summer student will be hired to assist with some of these issues of funding
- Beginning May 1st 2013 will be 4.5% raise up to \$18.51/hour
- The president is working hard to lobby for graduate students
- Questions:
 - What does mark conversion scheme mean? Is the GPA not a standard unit of measurement
 - No at the U of S we use a percentage not the same system at other universities we need to have a constant grade conversion
 - This is important that people coming in have an equal playing field
 - Colleges has a funding where they can distribute is there any way to standardize this
 - This goes against what the college does (does not tell department what to do as they are their own system)
 - Reviewing stipends and scholarship is tuition taken into account? Is a domestic student and amount received going to be the same as an international student given that the tuition is different
 - Unsure how this is being reviewed, correct that not all scholarships have not gone up
 - Up until 3 years ago we were the only university without a differential fee
 - It does ultimately come back to graduate students for a variety of initiatives such as dean scholarships
 - It also recognizes the fact that domestic students have parents that pay taxes and this is reflected in tuition
 - How can graduate students collaborate with the college in terms of looking at scholarships and stipend reviews
 - Through the GSA executives GSA executives designate committee members
 - Each individual college has their own autonomy and has a devolved fund from the CGSR will need to discuss with your own college on how the decisions are made for how they spend the money CGSR can only advise on how the money should be distributed

- Student can be on the CGSR committee but this would only advise the departments
- Is there any way to sort out how supervisors distribute fund
 - This is up to the college dean
 - CGSR only has 1 cap, so there is no reason why you can't hold more than 1 scholarship at once but it is up to the supervisor
 - CGSR does not have the authority over the other deans and the supervisors

7.0 Presentation from Zafer Bashi regarding Entrepreneurship for Grad Students program

- Zafer is a grad student and had a final so a representative from the industry liaison
- Start up company specialist Lorna Shaw-Lennox
- Trying to create an innovative environment at our university
- Kauffman is a large innovation group in the states paper in 2012
 - American governments and university are putting resources are providing more opportunities for innovation
 - Paper looked at how to get the technology transferred through entrepreneurship
 - Most of these companies had a student involved
- Office looks at the process for patenizing of technology
- More and more students coming out in phd's, however employment are declining
- Post-docs are escalating but it is an insecure position
- Grad students need to be prepared for employment other than academia
- Examples in the states include programs that match students with entrepreneurs
- Providing graduate students with a chance to see commercialization as a career option
- This is beginning to be recognized that entrepreneurship is never lost
- Proposing a 2 year program in 4 segments 2 classes in each segment at the end you get a certification saying that you made it through this program – this is a legal program
- Help you to see if you have the right to work in the program
- Proposing that the program be \$200 per class/segment to ensure the student has provided a token of commitment
- All of these classes would be related to the research or an area of interest
- Certification will be provided at the end
- Discussion what do graduates think of this proposal?
 - 4 hours is a long time will it be lecture for the time or an interaction
 Workshops are mostly very interactive
 - Is this a continuing education?
 - Yes
 - End result is it just a certificate or business plan etc.
 - Hope to help increase students get jobs or start up industries to provide more jobs
 - Have business communities been engaged?
 - In dialogue difficult getting engaged at first start
 - Are slowly picking up on this they want to see programs that bring academics into business

- Social sciences a possibility yet?
 - Right now it is primarily technology right now but if there is enough interest, there would looked into the social sciences innovation
- If a grad student create a new product, who own the patent?
 - The university if royalties come back from licensing, the student will get 50% and the other is distributed through the college, university, etc.
- Is there any website for this?
 - Not yet program is not approved yet

8.0 Presentation from Dmitriy Chesnakov regarding independent survey

- On March 6th, he had sent a survey out to all course councillors that were available on the GSA website regarding their satisfaction of the course councillors with the GSA
- 81 emails sent out 12 responses received
- About 464 students understand what GSA does
- Highlight comments:
 - More transparency wanted
 - More communication with students and adding more voices for communication
 - Earlier agenda to be sent out (at least 1 week
 - Decisions are made without discussion at the course council meetings
 - More comments available online
- Desire to receive more information about the GSA without having to attend a course council meeting
- Questions
 - Which departments responded?
 - Confidential
 - Was this a personal initiative?
 - Yes due to own experiences
 - Are results conclusive numbers may be a bit skewed?
 - Just showing what the responses were
 - Results seem skewed as the results were from people who had a negative view. As someone who did not respond, it was due to the questions appearing adversarial. The positive feedback may not be represented. Why wasn't the course councillor not approached about this. Was the "GSA" referred to this referring to executives or course councillors?
 - This is only from personal experience
 - This is a good way to keep course councillors communicating and on track
 - Wondering if this information can be sent out to more students

- GSA executives appreciate this effort to being involved invitation to discuss more with the executives in the future
- Good intentions but all students should be contacted as not all course councillors behave the same

WHEREAS the GSA, as a non-profit organization, should endeavor to keep budgets more-or-less balanced, and

WHEREAS the VP Finance is projecting a significant surplus from the current 2012-2013 budget, and

WHEREAS Graduate students are often in need of travel bursaries so they can attend conferences and present their research,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT a portion of the surplus from the current 2012-2013 budget is earmarked for travel bursaries to be awarded to members of the GSA during the 2013-2014 fiscal year,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the portion of the surplus earmarked for these travel bursaries be determined by the current VP Finance after the 2012-2013 fiscal year is completed,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT these travel bursaries shall be awarded by the 2013-2014 Travel Grant Committee, as stipulated in the revised GSA policies,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT these travel bursaries shall not exceed \$500.00 per student, shall require a detailed outline of the student's travel expenses, and shall require the student to be presenting their research at the conference in question.

FEBRUARY EXECUTIVE REPORTS

1) VP STUDENT AFFAIRS

Student Orientation

I am meeting with the USSU pertaining to the September orientation. We plan to share the use of the Bowl as a venue for the September orientation with USSU as the university prohibited us from using the grounds around the GSA for this event. This engagement will ensure that we have one day in the orientation week specially dedicated to the GSA.

Student Residence:

I had a meeting with the director student services pertaining to matters student residence, the residence rates, residence facility conditions, the infrastructure and also the way the students are treated and handled by the persons employed at the residence. We agreed to have deliberate on these issues next week.

On-Campus News

I attended the On-Campus News advisory Board meeting last week where issues to do with the print and circulation and stories to be carried in the issues were discussed.

Meeting with the Mayor

We are organizing a meeting with the Mayor and the city council of Saskatoon to try and negotiate the U-Pass. We are striving to ensure that we get an opt-out option for students who do not wish to pay for the U-Pass or those who own cars.

2) VP OPERATIONS and ADMINISTRATION

4) **VP FINANCE**

An updated budget is on the web (<u>http://gsa.usask.ca/main/about-gsa/budget/</u>), please not it does not include maintenance and operating costs for March since the University has not yet billed us for these. These costs are typically telephone and postage, usually less than \$100.00.

The main difference between this budget and last month's budget is the \$1000.00 deposit we paid the Radisson Hotel out of the Executive Discretionary Fund for the GSA Awards Gala has been deducted from our final bill, so I have credited the discretionary fund by \$1000.00. The full budget for the GSA Awards gala will be presented by the VP External.

The "Commons Supplies" budget is overspent, by the end of April it will likely be even more overspent, but not by an alarming amount.

Despite overspending the Commons Supplies, Orientation, and Audit accounts, and running the GSA Awards Gala, I am projecting a \$10 000.00 surplus by the end of April. This is mostly due to revenues being significantly larger than anticipated, and our "Commons Renewal Reserve" already containing the recommended maximum reserve (\$40 000.00).

5) ABORIGINAL LIAISON

The AIGSC hosted two events in March, in connection to Aboriginal Achievement Week.

- 1. Aboriginal Women in Leadership March 11, 2013. This event was successful and well attended. The panelists provided their perspective on leadership; their words were thoughtful and inspiring.
- 2. Aboriginal Graduate Studies Panel March 12, 2013. Due to scheduling issues and competition with other great seminars, this panel was not well attended. The panelists provided context behind graduate studies, research and the importance of higher education.

The AIGSC will be hosting an event in April.

This event is a small fundraiser and will celebrate the end of the semester. Please join us on the last day of class, April 9, 2013 for steak night at 6 PM (Location: Sutherland Bar and Grill). 6) VP EXTERNAL

• The GSA Fees were calculated based on a 3% increase in membership and a 5% increase in the GSA fee (the latter was approved at the February Course Council Meeting). This was the same rubric used to estimate the GSA Fees for the 2012-2013 year.

- We are not sure whether a handbook will be printed this year or next year (over half the handbooks from the previous year were never used by students), we our checking our contractual obligations on this matter
- We anticipate revising our policy for commons bookings to make the space available for students more often; therefore we expect a reduction in revenue from commons booking.
- CGSR matches our contribution to student need bursaries. We will award 40 \$1000.00 bursaries (likely 10 in summer term, 15 in fall term, 15 in winter term, but this is left to the discretion of the executives).

• Office salaries have been increased because we are giving our office manager a small raise and we would like to increase the hours the commons are open.

• Executive stipends will remain the same as they were for the current fiscal year (\$433.33 per month for each VP, \$500.00 per month for the president).

• The Executive Discretionary Fund is for small purchases that are deemed necessary by the Executive but are not otherwise budgeted for. The Executive must unanimously agree on these expenses, and no more than \$500.00 per month may be spent from this account.

- We are hoping that more course councils and clubs will join the GSA; hence the funding will remain the same even though these accounts are not expected to be fully spent in the current fiscal year.
- We are increasing the refreshments budget to allow food to be served at every council and committee meeting.
- External conferences are regional, national, and international conferences at which the VP External represents the GSA.
- While we did not run a GSA Conference this year, we plan on running one next year. A proper conference will need more funding than the \$2 500.00 previously budgeted.
- We expect to repeat the GSA Awards Gala, and also treat this event as the GSA Conference Banquet.
- The GSA Fall Orientation BBQ is attended by a huge number of graduate students and historically has over-spent its budget. Because of the large attendance at this event we feel it is appropriate to increase the budget significantly; this may allow additional activities to be included.
- The U of S Student Travel Fund is a University-wide fund for awarding travel bursaries. The GSA has been a long-term contributor to this fund. Since the total travel awards claimed by GSA members far exceeds our \$6 000.00 contribution, we should continue to support this fund.
- The Office Supplies and Operating Costs budgets have been rearranged in the 2013-2014 budget; in previous budgets the exact costs that should be expensed to each account was not clear. We are also planning on eliminating our digital cable service that is almost never used by our members but costs about \$1000.00 annually. This is why the total for these two accounts is less than that for the current fiscal year.

Note that the GSA does not have authority to spend money collected as health and dental premiums or CFS fees on anything other than the costs invoiced by our health and dental plan provider or the CFS, respectively.

• The Health and Dental claims for the current fiscal year are expected to be significantly less than the fees collected to cover these claims.

- In the 2013-2014 fiscal year a dental office will open on campus, and we expect the dental claims to increase significantly.
- We also anticipate revising the coverage of our health and dental plan in the 2013-2014 fiscal year.
- Because of these two points, our health and dental fees will remain the same as last year; we expect increased coverage and claims to absorb the surpluses from previous years and match the fees collected from this year.

MOTION TO SET UP GSA TRAVEL BURSARIES

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WHEREAS the GSA, as a non-profit organization, should endeavor to keep budgets more-orless balanced, and

WHEREAS the VP Finance is projecting a significant surplus from the current 2012-2013 budget, and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT these travel bursaries shall not exceed \$500.00 per student, shall require a detailed outline of the student's travel expenses, and shall require the student to be presenting their research at the conference in question.
