Dear GSA Members,

It is my pleasure to provide you the annual report of my activities as the Vice President - Finance and to give you updated information on the finances and budget of the Graduate Students Association (GSA). I would like to thank our GSA Office Manager Sherri Rohovich along with all our wonderful co-ordinators, volunteers, and most importantly, you - the members for making this a very successful year at your Graduate Students Association. I want to offer my particular gratitude to the members of the Finance and Audit Committee for their assistance this year. I would also like to acknowledge Mr. David Benett for his generous assistance throughout the year in the matters of book keeping. The following is a highlight of the activities and tasks that took place under my portfolio:

Free Tax filing services:

I succeeded in collaborating with CFS and UFile to bring free tax filing services on campus. For the very first time, such a service was introduced wherein, a team of 14 graduate student volunteers were trained for this service, which successfully benefitted 126 students (with spouses) over a five-day period. The feedback received was extremely positive and encouraging. A request to continue this service for the next year was made by almost every student highlighting the need of such service through GSA.

Financial Literacy workshops:

With the collaboration of Royal Bank of Canada, GSA held a financial literacy workshop each term to bring awareness among graduate students about personal banking and effective money management. Topics like handling credit cards, student loans, Tax free savings account and GIC were discussed in detail. Each workshop had a turnout of about fifty students and the feedback received appreciated the initiative.

Academic council funding:

GSA Council funding was calculated based on a formula preset in GSA policies that states: Academic Councils may receive up to \$3.00 per full time student or \$1.50 per part time students according to the following formula: $c = [x \times (3.00) + y \times (1.50)] \times [a/b]$

, where c is the funding received by the Academic Council, x is the number of full time students, y is the number of part time students, a is the number of meetings attended by Academic Councillors and b is the possible attendance rate by the number of registered Academic Councillors. The cheques were prepared and made available to different academic councils in September 2016. The academic council attendance for 2016/17 was better than the previous year and hopefully will be even better in the coming year.

Student club funding:

In addition to the funding to Councils, GSA provided funding to around twenty-two student groups for various activities and initiatives like club socials, conferences, retreats, fundraising, and cultural events. This year we received an overwhelming response for student club funding from various student groups. Such funding helps in establishing a communication between GSA executives and its members. Hopefully, the response will be even more demanding next year.

RISE conference:

Along with VP student affairs, VP academic and aboriginal liaison, I attended 2017 RISE conference in Winnipeg, Manitoba. The conference highlighted many of the social issues related to minority communities with emphasis on racism and its adverse impacts. The conference also highlighted how to avoid the stigma associated with such issues. It was a three-day long conference packed with panel discussion, workshops, open and close discussions among other events. It was alarming to hear about the personal and professional problem faced by aboriginal students.

Committee appointment and meetings:

In addition to the awards committee, I also represented GSA at the University fee review committee. I was able to provide exact figures for GPass to University of Saskatchewan with the help of Saskatoon Transit Services. The GPass for 2017/18 fall and winter term will be \$108.44. I also raised my concern for increased University athlete fees which was reconsidered by the committee and the GSA president was in contact with the committee in this regard.

Scholarships and Awards:

A major part of my responsibilities as an elected Executive member is to attend various meetings representing the GSA. Funding and scholarships are obviously a major concern of virtually all grad students. I represented the voice of GSA in two different university scholarship and award committees (one is a sub-committee of University Council and the other is a sub-committee of the College of Graduate Studies and Research). I adjudicated 234 applications for various scholarships (49 University continuing scholarship, 132 Dean's round 1 and 59 Dean's round 2 including domestic and international applications). I am also representing GSA in University Graduate student awards which is happening on April 23rd. In all these committees, the number of scholarships have not been raised. CGPS is yet to decide where to put the million dollars that was reported last year.

GSA need based bursary committee:

I sat in this committee once each term for 2016/17 to evaluate applications from graduate students. The committee evaluated an average of 120 applications per term for the year 2016/17. GSA distributed 10 bursaries each term and CGPS contributed in providing an additional 30 bursaries in fall and winter terms. The rubric for evaluating the application needs to be defined where VP Operations is working in collaboration with university Officials. My sincere thanks to all committee members, VP academic and VP operations for arranging the meetings on time and in extending their help to evaluate the applications to the best of their efforts.

Insurance and ISC returns:

The GSA is mandated to file year-end financial returns and maintain up-to-date registry information with the Information Services Corporation (a government-approved body that manages all business and non-profit registered in Saskatchewan). The deadline for submitting this information every year is August 31st but the information that is being submitted represents the GSA's end of year financial position of April 30th. This was successfully completed. I submitted the annual returns for 2015/16 and the incoming VP

will be filing 2016/17 returns. Other insurances like non- profit Directors and officers and Commons insurance were also successfully completed ensuring safe GSA work practice. Worker compensation Board:

The WCB considers Executives who are paid honorariums to still be employees for their purposes of coverage. Our WCB premiums are currently up-to-date. Also of note, we received a Certificate of Achievement from the WCB for having a zero injury year again this year. My congratulations to the VP Operations, Office Manager and staff for ensuring a safe workplace! I should also note that the GSA has received a credit on our account from the Workers' Compensation Board in the amount of \$61.93.

GSA financial budgeting:

Along with the dedicated volunteers of the GSA's Finance and Audit Committee, I chaired this committee and together we crafted and presented an operating budget for the 2017-18 financial year. This budget is now available for any further amendments. A detailed report has been attached along with the descriptors. The committee carefully determined the pros and cons of various GSA services like Crisis Aid program, Campus Legal services and took decisions that support student success and sustainable spending.

An effective Important financial and administrative task that I accomplished this year include making monthly financial statements public to provide enhanced transparency. All monthly Statements were made available for public to look at. Due to the privacy concerns raised by governance committee members, these monthly statements were taken off from GSA website. These statements are available on demand. All book keeping was done using the accounting code structure developed by previous VP Finance.

Tech Venture Challenge:

Mr. Tedric Soh, a graduate student from U of S won TVC in 2016. With the help of University liaison office an agreement was made that laid the terms of loan amount i.e. \$10,000 for the recipient. This agreement was signed by Mr. Tedric Soh, GSA President

and GSA VP finance releasing an amount of \$8,000. Rest \$2,000 will be released upon providing satisfactory expense details.

Other updates:

Fundraising: I was successful in fundraising amount from Royal Bank of Canada this year. It was the first time when our banking service i.e. RBC was actively involved in GSA events and initiatives.



RECOMMNEDATIONS

 planning and implementation takes a lot of time.
 - The winter Orientation is usually collaborated with the university as the incoming students are very few during that time. It is better to start planning for the winter orientation in late October or early November as various facilities are involved in planning and implementation during such weather.
- The recruitment of the council from various disciplines should be started in the beginning of the term.
- The survey needs to be collected from the ethics approval and need to be run to collect the data.
- The childcare facility for grad students could be worked on to know the slots availability, the registration could be done through GSA itself so that we can improve the facility in future.
- Residence: A good number of grad students live in university residence and there are some
 concerns that always come forward. It is important to have a good relation with consumer
 services in order to tackle the concerns in a strategic manner.



2017 Three Minute Thesis and Graduate Student Research Conference- March 29,30 & 31/2017











The 2017 process for The Three Minute Thesis began with the appointment of the 3MT and Graduate Student Research Conference Coordinator on January 16 /2017. This term two position was awarded to Derek Sutherland a Graduate Student at The University of Saskatchewan in the

Department of Philosophy. Derek was paid with the Graduate Service Fellowship from the College of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies at the end of every month until April 28/2017. Derek Sutherland coordinated the events and raised funds from two colleges. The first was The College of Nursing in the amount of \$ 300 dollars. The second was The College of Pharmacy and Nutrition in the amount of \$ 400 dollars. Derek also sent e-mails to every college and various graduate chairs and deans on campus with letters of request for financial support for The Three Minute Thesis and Graduate Student Research Conference. There were a number of responses to these inquiries. These responses were positive but were nevertheless negative. The primary reason given for a lack of financial support was due to the impending provincial budget and the subsequent belt tightening approach of colleges and departments.

Despite the budgetary constraints, the primary goal of the 2017 Three Minute Thesis and graduate Student Research conference was to increase the standing of the Graduate Students' Association at the University of Saskatchewan and in the province of Saskatchewan. Thus, the actual spent budget was approximately \$ 7500 dollars. Though this amount is more than what was spent on previous 3MT's, it nonetheless, reflects the work done before and shows that the Graduate Students' Association is dedicated to continually raising the profile of the organization. The line by line break down of the spent amounts on the 2017 Three Minute Thesis and Graduate Student Research conference will be confirmed and presented to the GSA Executive and Council as soon as all the numbers are available. Some budget specifics, the budget contribution from the College of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies was: \$ 2000 for the prizes, 2 lunches at \$ 800 dollars each for March 29 and 30/2017, 2 Coffees at \$ 80 dollars each for March 29 and 30/2017, \$ 1004.60 for EMAP video recording and production, Judges gifts for \$ 500 dollars and \$ 250 dollars for printing. There is also \$ 5000 dollars available from the GSA budget for The

2017 Three Minute Thesis and Graduate Student Research Conference. The actual expenses for the entire Three Minute Thesis and The Graduate Student Research Conference equals dollars. The next paragraph will outline how the Three Minute Thesis and Graduate Student Research Conference transpired.

The 2017 Three Minute Thesis and Graduate Student Research Conference took place on March 29, 30 and 31/2017. There were fifty-eight participants registered for the Three Minute thesis which took place on March 29 and 30/2017. There was also a total of four panel judges. On the first day, the judges present were Dr. Robert Henderson, Dr. Jay Kalra, Jim Pulfer, University of Saskatchewan Senate Member and Danielle Chartier, MLA. The judges on the second day were Jim Pulfer, Dr. Robert Henderson and Dr. Jay Kalra. For the Graduate Student Research Conference on March 31 / 2017 there were twenty-three participants registered. For the Three Minute Thesis, there were two catered lunches offered from 12 Noon to approximately 1:15 PM on both March 29 and 30/2017. For the Graduate Student Research Conference, there was one catered lunch on March 31 / 2017 from 12:45 – 1:45 PM. The three-minute thesis had three winners. These winners received money prize and one free ticket to the 2017 GSA Gala held on April 1/2017 at The Delta Bessborough in Saskatoon. Specifically, the prizes for the top three finishers were 1st place \$ 1000 dollars, second place \$ 500 dollars and the third-place prize was \$ 250 dollars. There were also four honourable mentions who each received one free ticket to the GSA Gala on April 1/2017 at The Delta Bessborough in Saskatoon.

In summary the Three Minute Thesis and Graduate Student Research Conference was a rewarding and successful event. However, as with all events held at an institution as diverse and busy as The University of Saskatchewan there is room for improvement. There is no need at this time to go into an entire list of pros and cons of this experience, but one crucial recommendation

needs to be explained. It has been recommended that a key way to improve the Three Minute Thesis and the Graduate Student Research Conference is to have the college and departments hold their versions of the Three Minute Thesis and mini conferences. From this the colleges would have, for instance, the top three finishers, come to the University wide finals organized and held by The GSA. The GSA would then provide the winner for the regionals. This decentralization of the organizational aspects would ease the pressure on The GSA and also help to have a better account of the actual attendance and confirmation of the participants. The reason is that when the participants who come from the college or departmental level would be encouraged by their supervisors or department heads to attend. As it stands, the central organizational framework, though commendable, requires the VP – Academic and the Coordinator to spend too much time on persuading participants to come to the event. With this alternative approach the persuasive aspect for the VP- Academic and the coordinator would ease and allow them to continue to increase the professional aspect and University wide recognition of the event.

Committees:

Another rewarding part of the role of the VP – Academic is the attendance and participation on various committees over the year. These committees touched on many interesting aspects of the graduate student experience at The University of Saskatchewan. The diverse viewpoints given at these committees give me hope that the direction the university is traveling is one of inclusion, recognition, accountability and transparency to continue to develop The University of

Saskatchewan into one of Canada's premier academic institutions. The list of committees I attended are:

Racialised and Indigenous Student Experience (RISE) Summit



In keeping with the theme of racial recognition and the continuance of anti-colonization in the Academy I attended and important three day conference in Winnipeg, Manitoba titled RISE. At this conference I learned more about the multiple ways that indigenous groups, women and various minorities have and continue to experience ongoing explicit and subtle discrimination and racism. The following is from the rise media promotion and outlines the purpose of this vital conference:

Students at post-secondary institutions across Canada have been at the forefront of organizing against racialised and colonialist violence on their university and college campuses, as well as within their communities, for decades.

We are proud to announce that both the Canadian Federation of Students-Manitoba and Canadian Federation of Students – Saskatchewan will be hosting Prairie — Racialised and Indigenous Student Experience (RISE) Summit in Winnipeg. The Prairie RISE Summit will be a life changing opportunity for students to develop a common vision to combat racism and colonialism. The event is a closed space for students that identify as Racialized and/or Indigenous.

Hundreds of students from Manitoba and Saskatchewan will gather together for a weekend of workshops, speakers, storytelling, sharing, and action planning, with the theme of healing and empowerment. Come be a part of this important event!

Hearing Boards and Student Advocacy:

Once per month I had the honour to be a part of the Hearing Boards. These meetings were both rewarding and challenging. The rewarding aspect is to see that the University is aware of the needs of students as they navigate their graduate experience. The challenging aspect is that at times the outcome of these boards seems to take time that many students' and administrators do not have time to properly address the complexity of these difficult issues. However, I found the experience to still be one of humility and respect and learned a lot about how Universities work in Canada.

Welcome Note

Thank you to all the members who supported me during my time as VP External. This year has been highly productive to the GSA internally and externally. I have worked on many of the initiatives to provide sustainability to the association. The GSA has grown a positive reputation over the past two GSA executive terms and I await the growth of the association in the future to come.

Many thanks to the council members for being critical and providing important insights to the association. We have been able to accomplish a lot this year and it's because of your dedication and hard work, so thank you.

A huge thank you goes to the Office Manager, Sherri Rohovich! Thank you for always being there to help the team.

1. Lobbying/Day of Action

The CFS-SK component lobbied the provincial government with three asks: 1. Eliminate tuition fees; 2. Increase non-repayable, up-front grants for Indigenous learners. 3. Sustainable and stable mental health funding. Further, we partnered with Northern Teacher Education Program (NORTEP)-Northern Professional Access College (NORPAC) is an education institute in Northern Saskatchewan. The provincial government signed a 5-year agreement in 2015 to fund NORTEP-NORPAC and is no longer upholding this agreement. NORTEP-NORPAC is in the best years of it's program with the highest enrolment rate. The provincial government has asked NORTEP-NORPAC to consolidate with another post-secondary institute in the province.

At the National Graduate Student Caucus, graduate student leaders from the nation gathered to discuss pertinent issues to our members and how to move forward. The three top areas of concern across the nation were: 1. A Mental Health Strategy for Graduate Students; 2. Beyond Child-Friendly Campuses; 3. Student and Worker Solidarity. We also shared best-practices around governance structures and member engagement.

This year the GSA undertook a huge commitment to mobilize students on November 2nd for the National Day of Action against tuition. We had the most successful event in the province with 75 to 100 students attending. We also had media coverage with 4 different broadcasters. We had endorsement from the Faculty Association, CUPE Local, and the Saskatchewan Labour Board.

2. GU15

The U15 is, since 2011, a group of 15 research intensive universities in Canada who meets twice per year to exchange common concerns, best practices and to provide political views. The GU15 on the other hand, is an informal meeting of but not-exclusively, associations representing the graduate students of these 15 universities. This group of graduate students now meets twice per year at different locations to also discuss best practices.

In August of 2016 I travelled, with VP Operations & Communication, to Hamilton, Ontario to attend the second annual GU15 meeting at McMaster University.

At this meeting we talked about getting student representation on TRI-Council's governing bodies. Further, it was discussed that having student representation on the Board of Governance of universities is 'best practice' amongst the U15.

However, a lengthy discussion by McMaster. Waterloo, UBC, and University of Montreal was around incorporation of GU15. A vote of 7 to 9 participating graduate student leaders voted for incorporation. The new identity of GU115 was to have a think tank, ThinkGRAD Graduate Research and Development), for graduate students across the nations to come together and share best-practice and set lobbying priorities for federal governments. It was decided that the University of Saskatchewan would host the first ThinkGRAD conference in April 2017. This decision was made by the previous VP External and VP Finance when they attended the GU15 meeting in April 2016.

3. ThinkGRAD

ThinkGRAD is scheduled to occur April 19^{th} to 21^{st} at the time of writing this report I have little information about the conference to share. The agenda item deadline is April 17^{th} and registration is open until April 14^{th} . Thank you Naheda for your help in planning this initiative.

4. STUDENTCARE

I worked with STUDENTCARE representative (Colten Yamagishi & Kirstin Foster) on the negotiation of the health and dental plan for graduate students and post-doctoral fellows. The Health & Dental committee of council made a recommendation to increase our health and dental plan by 5% to ensure we will not over spend the money in the reserve. It was also suggested that we work with the post-doctoral fellow (PDF) union to have PDFs automatically enrolled in our health and dental plan to help subsidize the cost. Currently we have approximately 100 PDFs enrolled in the plan which affects the overall claims made. This is something the VP Finance & Operations should continue to work on with the Health & Dental committee of council.

5. Board of Governance

I have worked with the GSA President on this initiative meeting with the leader of the opposition, Trent Wotherspoon NDP to discuss the importance of having student representation on the Board of Governance. This would require the University of Saskatchewan 1995 Act and it was important to have provincial government support. Further, I helped in the development of the GSA President's presentation for the Government in Regina, due to my class schedule I was unable to attend. Further, I met with the Governance committee and Board of Directors of the University to discuss the importance of student representation.

6. GSA 5th Annual Awards Gala

This year I planned the 5th Annual Awards Gala on April 1st, 2017 at the Delta Bessborough. We had approximately 270 guests in attendance (including the honorable Mayor, Dean and Associate Dean of College of Graduate and Post-Doctoral Studies, Faculty Association, Alumni Association, Associate Dean of Arts and Science, Senate and Board members of the university) with many compliments on the decoration and theme "Great Gatsby".

This task was a huge undertaking as it required fundraising the entirety. I was successful to get sponsorships from the different associations, colleges, and units on campus as well as securing off-campus sponsors. Thank you to the GSA Gala coordinator Kereen Morrison-Spence for her help, to our MCs, and to the photographer who helped captured a memorable night.

7. Misc. Initiatives

- I worked on a garden for the GSA with the office of sustainability. This is an initiative I hope the Sustainability Committee of council continues to work on.
- I also worked on the Health Chat initiative and am currently working with VP Operations & Communication to create a sustainable plan for this initiative as mental health is a concern for our members.
- I worked on the GSA Survey proposal with College of Graduate Students and Post-doctoral studies and the development of the final draft. It is unfortunate that ethics was a barrier and hope to see this initiative move forward next year. Thank you VP Student Affairs for organizing the survey committee.
- I coordinated the GSA Guppies for the Campus Rec intramural teams.

To whom it may concern:

It has been my pleasure to be in the role of Aboriginal Liaison for the Graduate Students' Association since mid-January. The purpose of this report is to provide you with an update of my activities throughout the year.

Through my short tenure in this position (less than three months at the time of writing), I have pursued many endeavors on campus. I have attended all GSA council meetings and town halls since mid-January, and learned a great deal about the GSA and the greater graduate student population. I have the privilege of meeting with the president and other high ranking administrative members monthly during our 'breakfast with the president' sessions, during which I raised issues of reconciliation and Indigenous student organization. I have focused on the institution's path to Indigenization, working with students to discuss the meaning of Indigenization from our perspective, and providing guidance to various committees on the topic (e.g., the Teaching, Learning and Academic Resources Council, the Learning Charter Revisions Committee, and the Governance Committee). I have also worked to represent graduate students in general at events (such as the Reconciliation Forum in early March and the Aboriginal Achievement Week event) and on committees.

I have also been involved with events taking place in the GSA, by attending social events to get to know graduate students, and helping to select recipients of the GSA awards to be given at the annual GSA Gala (organized by Carolyn Gaspar). I work closely with the Indigenous Graduate Students' Council (IGSC), and much of our work is directly related to Indigenous graduate student experience. With the IGSC, we have given out two \$500 bursaries, hosted a craft fair to showcase local Indigenous talent, organized an extremely successful Aboriginal Achievement Week event, and are in the process of organizing an Annual Steak Night Fundraiser to fund our bursaries for next year.

The work that I do to support and advocate for graduate students seems to permeate most of what I do here at the University of Saskatchewan. I hope that Indigenous graduate students feel well represented. I am working on getting to know the Indigenous graduate student better over my stay in this position. I welcome any questions.

PRELUDE

Prelude

This report is divided into five main sections. Each section extends thoroughly on one major general theme. The order of the sections as follows:

- Internal developments and improvements
- External initiatives
- Strategic initiatives
- GSA Services/ongoing services
- GSA Events

Internal developments and improvements

The GSA has undertaken substantial initiatives for internal improvements. The goal of these initiatives were initiated to improve the GSA strategic long term planning, enhance internal accountability, enhance GSA financial practice, and to improve the GSA service for the members.

1.1. Governance documents

Significant changes in GSA By-laws have been approved this year - March 13, 2017 in the GSA Special General Meeting. The GSA has created a new governance body (Board of Director)

The Board is to manage the business and affairs of the GSA, approve the GSA corporate or internal policies and procedures, and be responsible for strategic direction and planning of the GSA. The Board is composed of:

- GSA President and Vice President Operations and Finance;
- Two members of the GSA Council;
- Three graduate students elected by the general members; and
- Two alumni of University of Saskatchewan graduate programs.

The GSA has also merged four executive positions into two positions: VP Operations and Communications and VP Finance in one position, and VP Academic and Student Affairs in one position. This merge was based on a thorough review of the Graduate Students Associations

structure in U15 in Canada. The goal of this merge is to enhance and ensure the GSA representation on different university important committees, to reduce the day to ensure that their work is more focused on high level planning rather than on day to day work (this will be done by done by hiring a bookkeeper and coordinators to handle part of the executives' work.)

The changes in the GSA governance documents were done by months of hard work of the GSA Governance Review Committee as well as some consultation with governance experts on and off campus.

1.2. Internal review and audits

The GSA contracted KPMG as a professional service company to review the GSA internal documents, internal control, and finance practice. A large part of the historical audit has been done as well, and a temporary book keeper was hired to help in providing the required documents to the auditor.

This initiative was based on the GSA Governance Review Committee recommendations and with a generous support from the College of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

1.3. GSA strategic plan

The GSA formed a working group to start drafting a strategic plan for the GSA over the coming 5 years. The goal of this strategic plan is to keep the GSA on one track in terms of addressing the graduate students' needs. The GSA has a full-time office manager who handles a large

diverse workload, however the continuous change of executives each year and lack of continuity and training tend to create gaps in procedures. These gaps result in unresolved matters that carry over from year to year. We feel it is a crucial necessity to create a strategy for the GSA to go forward with sustainable growth. This goes together with the decision of creating a board of directors which will have a longer term (some of the board members will have 2 years term) and the plan that the board will oversee and ensure the process of the strategic planning.

1.4. GSA Council

This year was outstanding in-terms of GSA Council engagement, and participation. The GSA Council size exceeded 40 students representing most of the departments on campus, with new academic units registered for the first time as an academic council in the GSA. The engagement of the Council had great positive impact on decision making and communication with the university administration.

The GSA standing committees were formed in November 2017 and since then have been engaged actively in GSA planning, the Council as well approved two ad-hoc committees (Health and Wellness Committee, and Sustainability Committee). The composition of the standing committees as follows:

1.5. GSA Town Halls

The GSA organized four town halls this year to enhance the graduate students parturition in decision making and engage them in the important discussion. In November we hosted a tuition consultation town hall where we invited the Dean of the College of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies and the Integration and Planning Assessment to meet with the graduate students, hear from them, and inform them how the University set up the tuition. This town hall was one of the most successful town halls where the engagement of the students in the discussion was remarkable. Following this town hall I sent a letter to the Board of Governance members highlighting the graduate students perception of the tuition and informing the board members that a general feeling following the town hall was that graduate students have a very high sensitivity to any increase in tuition, and further that the IPA 3-Pillars are not the actual tool used in making the tuition recommendation rather the general financial conditions in the province and the projected governmental support for the University budget. Furthermore, students are hopeful that, in light of the fact that many are paid a stipend for their research, tuition could become a non-issue so long as the focus turn to average funding net of tuition (and that that figure allow an average student to pay for living expenses in Saskatoon).

Two town halls were hosted in February and March to discuss with the students the proposed governance changes in the GSA, the town halls were well attended and GSA member's inputs were well taken by the Governance Review Committee.

1.6. GSA representation on University committees

The GSA representation on the University Council, Senate, University Council Sub-committees, College of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies (CGPS), and different Search committees was remarkable. The University Secretary office and the CGPS office provided the GSA President with the Executives attendance on different committee ever three month to ensure that the GSA voice is heard in different important discussion. External Initiatives

The GSA was heavily involved in student politics at both provincial and national levels. The GSA participated in various initiatives to show solidarity with other students in the province and at the national level.

2.1. GSA Student Campaigns

The GSA had a very successful year in-terms of campaigning, the GSA leadership was acknowledge by other colleges in other universities. The GSA took many initiative to increase the students' awareness of the importance of having a more accessible post-secondary education system in the province. Mobilizing the students to demand change becoming more vocal to align with other Canadian provinces. The GSA was proud to be the leading student body at the University of Saskatchewan to take this concept a step for-ward. This will reflect positively on our University and the future of the post-secondary education in our province.

Our mobilization efforts included: our Day of Action on November 2, 2016. Where the students alongside the workers, the University of Saskatchewan Faculty Association and Saskatchewan Federation of Labour stood together to request for more accessible post-secondary education in Saskatchewan. Our event was well covered by the local media and we feel we sent a clear message to all post-secondary education stakeholders in Saskatchewan, requiring a more accessible and just system.

GSA has also actively participated in lobbing the provincial government with three asks: 1. Eliminate tuition fees; 2. Increase non-repayable, up-front grants for Indigenous learners. 3. Sustainable and stable mental health funding. The GSA has as well support Northern Teacher Education Program (NORTEP)-Northern Professional Access College (NORPAC) in their campaign to ask the provincial government to keep funding this institute.

2.2. GSA Press Releases

The GSA has engaged very well in students politics and has actively took many initiatives to in response to some changes impacted directly the graduate students.

The GSA had a press release regarding the travel ban into the United States and it is potential consequences on graduate students at our University. As many of the graduate students are citizens of countries included in the ban. The GSA also worked with other graduate leaders in other Universities in Canada, consulting with our members, and the College of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies to investigate the potential consequences on our members' participation in conferences and other academic events.

In response to the provincial budget, the GSA worked with the University of Saskatchewan Faculty Association to try to minimize the impact of the changes in the budget on the graduate students, the GSA and USFA had a joint press release which was well received by the student, community members and the university and very well covered by the media. In the press release the GSA and USFA expressed deep concerns about the dramatic reduction in operating

funds after multiple years of provincial government cut backs and claw backs is jeopardizing the quality, affordability and accessibility of advanced education in Saskatchewan. And we further made a clear statement that Our Universities and post-secondary institutions serve the public good, add to the economy and are cherished by the people of the province. They must be appropriately funded to maintain and grow what we have. Media coverage is available via these links:

Cuts within 'tolerable limits'

There was some variation in the impact to different colleges but the university tried to keep cuts "within tolerable limits," Atkinson said.

"Some of our colleges have more surplus on hand than others, some of them are receiving funds year over year that they still have on hand," he said.

"We looked at that and we wanted to make a bit of an adjustment to allow for the fact that some of the colleges could probably handle the burden a little bit easier than others."

Atkinson said the student body was unlikely to notice any difference in programming in the short term, adding that the university would take measures to ensure the cuts did not impact student services.

Also on Wednesday, the U of S Graduate Students' Association expressed what it called "deep" concerns about the provincial budget cuts, saying they could jeopardize the quality, affordability and accessibility of advanced education in Saskatchewan.

"The elimination of tax credits for education, the cut in scholarship funding and the suspension of the Saskatchewan Advantage Grant for Education Savings will further impoverish students," said association

The Interim Provost and Vice-President Academic sent out an email to the University of Saskatchewan students and staff to keep everyone abreast of how they will be dealing with the budget cuts from the province.

Michael Atkinson says the overall provincial funding cut was approximately 5.6 per cent.

If the cuts are approved by the Board of Governors, they would include an 11 per cent cut in funding for the College of Agriculture and Bioresources.

That's the largest cut of the Colleges.

The next largest is a drop of 9.6 per cent in the College of Engineering.

Atkinson says the reduction to support centres comes after years of staff reductions and other operational budget cuts.

The University will look for alternative revenue sources and for cost saving measures.

Students and faculty at the University of Saskatchewan are united in their concern over budget cuts from the province.

Both the Graduate Students' Association and the U of S Faculty Association say the reduction in operating funds after many years of government cut backs will jeopardize the quality, affordability and accessibility of advanced education in Saskatchewan.

The average tuition at the U of S has increased more than 18 per cent since the 2012-13 academic year, according to Statistics Canada.

The President of the Graduate Students' Association, Ziad Ghaith, says this year it was the highest in Western Canada and next year it will increase again by another 2.3 per cent.

STRATEGIC GSA INITIATIVES

Strategic GSA Initiatives

The GSA undertook very important strategic initiatives, which I personally consider as the most significant GSA initiatives at least in the recent memory. The GSA has been working on ensuring graduate students representation on our University Board of Governance, and to advocate for developing compulsory supervisor-student guideline highlighting both the supervisors and their students' responsibilities.

3.1. Graduate Students representation on the University Board of Governance, University Council, and the University Senate

The GSA has been working on a very important initiative this year to have graduate students representation on the University Board of Governance. Huge efforts have been done toward this initiative. Where the GSA addressed this at the provincial government level, the university administration, and broader University stockholders. The GSA met with the Human Services Caucus Policy Committee (Legislative Assembly) to highlight this request by the graduate students' in the University of Saskatchewan and to address the importance of improving the representation for the Graduate Students in the University Council and to have at least one Graduate Students to sit on the Board of Governors, further the GSA addressed this need in almost every meeting of the University Council and Senate, many of the University faculty members and Senate members expressed their support for our genuine request.

The position of the GSA is that there is great potential benefit at the University and the Provincial level by having graduate students on these important committees. These benefits include but are not limited to:

At the University level:

- Better representation of the graduate students on the Board of Governors and the University Council, will ensure having graduate student (17% of total student population) insight into the University strategic and academic planning.
- 2. The graduate students' insights will ensure support of the university efforts in fulfilling its mission and vision as a leading research University.

At the Provincial level:

- The University of Saskatchewan is the leading research University in the province, improved graduate representation will support the University research portfolio as graduate students are part of research production at the university.
- 2. The University of Saskatchewan is part of U15 universities (intensive research universities) improved representation of the graduate students will ensure the university position on the U15 list, and hopefully improve the university current rank

At this stage of our advocacy to improve our representation, I would like to invite the incoming GSA executives and board to continue keeping this initiative as one of the GSA priorities as this initiative has crossed very important threshold in-terms of implementations.

In the same vein, I would like to draw our members attention to the fact that the University of Saskatchewan is the only University among the U15 where Graduate Students are unrepresented on the Board of Governors. The GSA believes that our institution needs to be on the same page in terms of governor's practice with other GU15. See the Table below for more details.

3.2. Student Advisor Guideline

The GSA has started an initiative to draft a guideline to be as used between supervisors and their students as a mandatory agreement as the students begin working on their research. This has been a growing issue that the graduate students have addressed many times to the GSA executives.

The GSA formed a working group including some Council members to work on this agreement, and consulted with the CGPS and different colleges, students, and graduate chairs in developing the draft. The draft document was presented in the University Council, the CGPS Council, and in cooperation with the CGPS associate Dean and the Office of the Vice Provost Teaching and Learning, the GSA had a meeting were more than 15 graduate chairs along other university unit directors were invited to discuss the proposed agreement and to give their inputs.

This initiative was well received by the University Administration, the CGPS Dean and Associate Dean, and many graduate chairs and Faculty members. The final document has been recently sent to the CGPS Academic Affairs Committee for their review. The time line of this initiative is illustrated below.
